Before and After

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Answer: **HABILIMENTS**

The "poem" that sounds Shakespearean is, expectedly enough, composed of actual lines from his plays; while some are familiar on their own, looking at the lines immediately before or after them often yields more recognizable quotations. Though Shakespeare did sign his name (among many other ways) as "Wm. Sha" at times, the collection of nearby quotes and this particular signature (in addition to the heavy cluing in the flavortext) point to William Shatner and the various incarnations of *Star Trek*. Note the positions of capitalized letters for later.

Of course, given the puzzle's title, now is the time to look the other direction. If the quote came from the line before, we look at the episode after, and vice versa, sorting the episodes we find by airdate as per the flavortext. Now we use the positions of the capitals from... earlier.

This gives us "PLATED IN X OF WAR" reading down, which to complete the Shakespeare quote and return to the original puzzle topic, yields the final answer: **HABILIMENTS**.

Author's Notes

<u>Nick</u>: More than two dozen Star Trek episode titles can be found in Shakespeare's plays. The puzzle's title not only hints at its mechanic, but also appears in *Hamlet* and is the name of a *Star Trek*: *Voyager* episode. Hinting at the sorting to be used, the lines are listed according to a plausible chronological ordering of the plays in which they appear.
